# BRIEF OF INTERVENOR REPRESENTATIVE JOANNA E. MCCLINTON, LEADER OF THE DEMOCRATIC CAUCUS OF THE PENNSYLVANIA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, IN SUPPORT OF PROPOSED CONGRESSIONAL REDISTRICTING PLAN

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### I. <u>BACKGROUND</u>

The United States Constitution requires that seats for the United States House of Representatives be divided amongst the states based upon the population size of each state as determined by the decennial United States Census. U.S. Const. Art. I § 4 and 2 U.S.C. § 2(c). *See* Pa. Const. art. II, § 1. Every ten years, each state must redraw its congressional districts—a task that in Pennsylvania is performed by the passage of a bill through both chambers of the General Assembly and signed into law by the Governor.

The 2020 Census revealed that Pennsylvania is assigned 17 seats in the United States House of Representatives. This is one less than the current 18 congressional seats assigned to Pennsylvania based upon the 2010 United States Census. Due to the reduction of in the number of seats allocated to Pennsylvania in the United States House of Representatives, a new congressional district map must be drawn to accommodate that reduction. As of today, legislation has neither been passed by the General Assembly nor signed into law by Governor Wolf designating the 17 congressional districts to which Pennsylvania is entitled.

On December 17, 2021, this matter was commenced by Petition for Review in this Court and docketed at 464 MD 2021 was commenced by Carol Ann Carter, Monica Parrilla, Rebecca Poyourow, William Tung, Roseanne Milazzo, Burt Siegel, Susan Cassanelli, Lee Cassanelli, Lynn Wachman, Michael Guttman, Maya Fonkeu, Brady Hill, Mary Ellen Balchunis, Tom DeWall, Stephanie McNulty, Janet Temin (collectively, the "Carter Petitioners") against Veronica Degraffenreid, in her official capacity as the Acting Secretary of the Commonwealth,<sup>1</sup> and Jessica Mathis, in her official capacity as Director for the Pennsylvania Bureau of Election Services and Notaries. The Carter Petitioners allege that Pennsylvania's current congressional map violates Article I, Section 2 of the United States Constitution; Article I, Section 5 of the Pennsylvania Constitution; and Title II, United States Code, Section 2c. Specifically, the gravamen of the Carter Petition is that due to significant population shifts since 2010, Pennsylvania's congressional districts are unconstitutionally malapportioned and unlawfully apportioned.

That same day, December 17, 2021, a similar action, was commenced by Petition for Review and docketed in this Court at 465 MD 2021, was brought by Philip T. Gressman, Ron Y. Donagi, Kristopher R. Tapp, Pamela Gorkin, David P. Marsh, James L. Rosenberger, Amy Myers, Eugene Boman, Gary Gordon, Liz McMahon, Timothy G. Feeman, and Garth Isaak, (collectively, the "Gressman Petitioners"). The Gressman Petitioners allege that Pennsylvania's current 18-seat congressional map is

malapportioned in violation of Article I, Sections 1, 5, 20, and Article II, Sections 16 and 26 of the Pennsylvania Constitution.

On December 20, 2021, the Commonwealth Court consolidated both actions under the lead docket number: 464 MD 2021. This Court also ordered that any party wishing to intervene in the consolidated matter pursuant to Pa. R. App. P. 1531(b) file an application by December 31, 2021.

Representative Joanna E. McClinton, Leader of the Democratic Caucus of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives ("House Democratic Caucus Intervenor" or "Representative McClinton"), filed a timely Application for Leave to Intervene and supporting Memorandum of Law. By Order dated January 14, 2022, after full briefing on the issue and a hearing<sup>2</sup>, this Court granted Representative McClinton's application on behalf of the House Democratic Caucus, to intervene in this matter and granting Representative McClinton full party status. Other parties representing subparts of the General Assembly granted Intervenor status in these matters are: (i) The Speaker and Majority Leader of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives and the President Pro

Tempore and Majority Leader of the Pennsylvania Senate;<sup>3</sup> and (ii) The Senate Democratic Caucus.<sup>4</sup>

Also in the January 14, 2022, this Court directed the parties to submit for the Court's consideration at least one but no more than two proposed 17-district congressional redistricting plan(s) that are consistent with the results of the 2020 Census and, if the party chooses to do so, a supporting brief and/or a supporting expert report, by 5:00 p.m. on Monday, January 24, 2022.

Pursuant to the Court's Order of January 14, 2022, the House Democratic Caucus Intervenor now submits for this Court's consideration a map for purposes of redrawing Pennsylvania's 17 congressional districts ("House Democratic Caucus Map"). The House Democratic Caucus Map is fully consistent with the United States Constitution, the Pennsylvania Constitution, and precedent established by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

The House Democratic Caucus Intervenor is aware of the exigency with which these matters must be resolved, a map decided, and implemented. The sole intention of the House Democratic Caucus Intervenor is to assist this Court in deciding upon a map that is compact, contiguous, minimizes division of political subdivisions, and

maintains equality among the populations of congressional districts. In an attempt to resolve this matter expeditiously and to establish a constitutional congressional map that satisfies all legal requirements, maintains communities of interest, is fair, and allows the public to participate meaningfully in their government, the House Democratic Caucus Intervenor submits one map for the Court's consideration rather than providing two maps as was permitted by this Court. For the reasons set forth herein, the House Democratic Caucus Intervenor respectfully requests that this Court accept the House Democratic Caucus Map.

## II. <u>ARGUMENT</u>

# A. <u>The House Democratic Caucus Map should be accepted because it meets</u> <u>the constitutional requirements for a congressional redistricting plan as</u> <u>set forth by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.</u>

The House Democratic Caucus Map<sup>5</sup> is constitutional under the criteria for congressional redistricting plans set forth by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania. To be constitutional under Article I, Section 5 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, the districts contained within a congressional redistricting plan must be compact and contiguous, as nearly equal in population as possible and not divided among subdivisions except to achieve equality of population. *League of Women Voters v. Commonwealth*, 178 A.3d 737, 816-17 (Pa. 2018) [hereinafter "*LWV*"]. The districts as

drawn in the House Democratic Caucus Map meet those criteria and should therefore be accepted by this Court.

Article I, Section 5 of the Pennsylvania Constitution provides that "Elections shall be free and equal; and no power, civil or military, shall at any time interfere to prevent the free exercise of that right of suffrage." Pa. Const. art. I, § 5. Of Article I, Section 5 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania has said:

> The broad text of [Article I, Section 5] mandates clearly and unambiguously, and in the broadest possible terms, that all elections conducted in this Commonwealth must be 'free and equal.' In accordance with the plain and expansive sweep of the words "free and equal," we view them as indicative of the framers' intent that all aspects of the electoral process, to the greatest degree possible, be kept open and unrestricted to the voters of our Commonwealth, and, also, conducted in a manner which guarantees, to the greatest degree possible, a voter's right to equal participation in the electoral process for the selection of his or her representatives in government. Thus, Article I, Section 5 guarantees our citizens an equal right, on par with every other citizen, to elect their representatives. Stated another way, the actual and plain language of Section 5 mandates that all voters have an equal opportunity to translate their votes into representation.

*Id.* at 804. In the Majority Opinion, Justice Debra Todd explained further that it is "axiomatic that a diluted vote is not an equal vote, as all voters do not have an equal opportunity to translate their votes into representation." *Id.* at 814. *See Wesberry v. Sander,* 376 U.S. 1 (1964).

The *LWV* decision set the standard for determining the constitutionality of congressional districts. In establishing this standard, the Supreme Court borrowed from the Pennsylvania Constitution's requirements for state legislative districts. To determine whether a congressional redistricting plan violates the Free and Equal Elections Clause of the Pennsylvania Constitution, courts must examine whether the congressional districts created under the plan are "composed of compact and contiguous territory; as nearly equal in population as practicable; and which do not divide any county, city, incorporated town, borough, township, or ward, except where necessary to ensure equality of population." *LWV* at 816-17.

Other factors play a role in redistricting, including "preservation of prior district lines, protection of incumbents, or the maintenance of the political balance which existed after the prior reapportionment." *Id.* at 817 (citing *Holt v. 2011 Legislative Reapportionment Comm'n*, 67 A.3d 1211, 1235 (Pa. 2013)). However, these considerations are subordinate to compactness and contiguity of districts, equality of population, and unity of subdivisions. *LWV*, 178 A.3d at 817. When any of these neutral criteria are subordinated, in whole or in part and regardless of intent on the part of the map creator, a congressional plan violates Article I, Section 5 of the Pennsylvania Constitution. *Id.* 

The House Democratic Caucus Map meets the neutral criteria for constitutionality under *League of Women Voters*. Under the House Democratic Caucus Map, populations between districts are as equal as practicable and reflect population shifts in the 2020 United States Census. The House Democratic Caucus Map reflects these population changes by drafting district boundaries to encompass the required population, with the result that there is a population deviation of only two people between the largest and smallest congressional districts.

Further, all parts of each district on the House Democratic Caucus Map are compact and contiguous. Numerous methods exist for measuring the geographic compactness of political districts. Two of the leading compactness measurements are the Polsby-Popper<sup>6</sup> and Reock<sup>7</sup> compactness scores.<sup>8</sup> While each uses a differing methodology, both seek to quantitatively analyze the boundaries of a district to determine if it is politically gerrymandered. Each method uses a scale of zero to one, with one being the most compact and zero being the least compact. The House Democratic Caucus Map has an overall Reock Compactness Score of .43 and a Polsby Popper Compactness Score of .28, both of which are in line with the map adopted by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court in 2018. Additionally, no district has been drawn to include noncontiguous territory.

The total population, deviation, Reock Factor, and Polsby-Popper Factor for each district in the House Democratic Caucus Map are provided in the below table:

In addition to satisfying the requirements of equal population, compactness, and contiguity, the House Democratic Caucus Map only divides political subdivisions when required to in order to address population equity. Of Pennsylvania's 67 Counties, the House Democratic Caucus Map divides only 16 counties (~23.8%). Perhaps more significantly, of Pennsylvania's 2,560 municipalities only 18 are divided (~.703%), and of Pennsylvania's 9,178 voting precincts only 16 (~.174%) are divided.

### III. <u>CONCLUSION</u>

For all the foregoing reasons, the House Democratic Caucus Intervenor respectfully requests that this Court accept the House Democratic Caucus Map for the 2022 Pennsylvania congressional redistricting plan.
