Magisterial District Reestablishment
2022 – 2032

Clarion County, the 18th Judicial District, has been instructed by the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts (AOPC) to participate in the decennial reestablishment of magisterial districts. Under 42 Pa.C.S. § 1503, the Pennsylvania Supreme Court is authorized to revise the number, boundaries and classes of magisterial districts within each judicial district in the year following the decennial federal census and as required for the efficient administration of justice. In compliance therewith, Clarion County President Judge Sara J. Seidle-Patton intends to propose the following plan for consideration by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court. The proposed plan recommends elimination of one of the four current magisterial districts within the 18th Judicial District as well as realignment of the remaining three magisterial districts. The plan is proposed to take effect on January 1, 2024 and is described in detail herein. The following narrative reviews the makeup of the current magisterial districts, analyzes the data provided by AOPC regarding caseload and workload for the current districts as they compare to each other and to other magisterial districts within the same class of county as Clarion County. The narrative also explains the plan for reestablishment based on the information as analyzed in light of the necessary considerations for proper reestablishment of the magisterial districts within the 18th Judicial District.

The principal purpose of the reestablishment process is to ensure Clarion County is equipped with the requisite number of magisterial districts to serve the needs of the County's judicial system for the effective and efficient administration of justice. The plan must recognize and accommodate caseload equality in terms of judicial workload among all magisterial districts within Clarion County. It is also necessary to evaluate the under- or over-utilization of judicial resources. Furthermore, the plan must take into consideration the current needs of the 18th Judicial District and forecast any changes in those needs that may occur within the next ten years. The plan, as proposed, does take into consideration the needs of Clarion County's judicial system including the number of magisterial districts within Clarion County as well as the boundaries of those districts to ensure caseload and workload equity among the judges until the next reestablishment.

Analysis of relevant caseload and workload data for 2014-2019

The average caseload for Clarion County, the 18th Judicial District, for the years 2014 to 2019 is 2,632 cases per year. In 2012, the last time reestablishment was conducted, the average caseload for the 18th Judicial District was 3,197. A downward trend in caseload over the past ten years has occurred. Additionally, Clarion County currently ranks 16th out of the 24 6th class counties in Pennsylvania in terms of average caseload and 5th out of the 5 7th class counties in Pennsylvania. In compiling this plan, data for both 6th class and 7th class counties was reviewed. The reason for this is that although Clarion County is currently a county of the 6th class, the Clarion County Commissioners were informed by letter dated October 1, 2021 from Acting Secretary of the Commonwealth that Governor Thomas Wolf has certified Clarion County as eligible to be re-classified as a 7th class county. A copy of the letter and certification is attached hereto. At the time of the preparation of this plan, the Clarion County Commissioners had not yet announced a final decision as to whether they will seek to reclassify the county from 6th class to 7th class. Because of the possibility for Clarion County to be reclassified, the caseload averages for the 18th Judicial District have been compared with those of both 6th class counties and 7th class counties. The average caseload among 6th class counties is 3,230. The average caseload among 7th class counties is 3,684. Based on these caseload numbers, Clarion County's magisterial districts fall nineteen percent (19%) below the average caseload for a 6th class county and twenty nine percent (29%) below the average caseload for a 7th class county.

In addition to caseload, another factor evaluated in the reestablishment process is the workloads of each of the district courts within the 18th Judicial District. The average workload for the 18th Judicial District as determined by the AOPC is 15,945. Two of the current magisterial district courts exceed the average workload and two of the district courts fall below the average workload. Specifically, District Court 18-3-01 is twenty eight percent (28%) above average and District Court 18-3-02 is three percent (3%) above average where District Court 18-3-03 falls eighteen percent (18%) below

average and District Court 18-3-04 falls thirteen percent (13%) below average. The AOPC suggests that if any magisterial district should have a total workload which is fifteen percent (15%) higher or lower than the workload of any other district court in the judicial district, realignment must be considered to avoid an unwarranted inequity among the magisterial district judges of the county. The disparities in the workloads among the four district courts within the 18th Judicial District as they currently exist indicate a need for realignment.

Some variance exists between the average number of cases filed in each of Clarion County's magisterial districts as provided by AOPC and the data relied upon in this plan. The reason for this variance is Clarion County's Central Court. Because Clarion County utilizes a central court model for criminal cases, the criminal caseload data has been distributed among all districts evenly, as all magisterial district judges are in a rotation to cover Central Court, thereby equalizing criminal caseloads and workloads across all four magisterial districts. This has been taken into consideration in calculating the workload and caseload data for each magisterial district.

After reviewing all relevant data, and engaging in discussions with the four current Magisterial District Judges in Clarion County, it has been determined that elimination of one of the four magisterial districts would be prudent at this time. It is expected that the caseload decline that has occurred over the past ten years will continue. According to the recent Census data, Clarion County has seen a decrease in overall population over the past ten years. In addition, economic growth and development remains stagnant. Clarion University has also experienced a decline in enrollment. It was predicted in the 2012 Reestablishment Plan for Clarion County that enrollment at Clarion University was expected to increase to 10,000 students. That has not occurred. Total undergraduate enrollment in 2019 was 3,776 students according to data reported on the University's website. Furthermore, with the recent consolidation of Clarion University with Edinboro University and California University of Pennsylvania to form the Pennsylvania Western University, plans were announced to focus on remote learning for students, which would result in less students physically relocating to the Clarion area to attend school.

Based on the above information, a continued decline in caseload in the 18th Judicial District over the next ten years can reasonably be expected. Elimination of a magisterial district as proposed in January 2024 will coincide with the expiration of the current term of Magisterial District Judge Duane Quinn. Judge Quinn has indicated his desire to retire at the end of his term. The retirement of Judge Quinn will allow for Magisterial District 18-3-01 to be eliminated. The municipalities currently within Magisterial District 18-3-01 – which include Clarion Township, Clarion Borough and Strattanville Borough – will be combined with some of the municipalities from the current Magisterial District 18-3-02 while other municipalities currently within 18-3-02 will be shifted to Magisterial Districts 18-3-03 and 18-3-04. The municipalities to be covered by each of the three proposed magisterial districts are set forth below. The table attached hereto identifies the caseload and workload data of the proposed magisterial districts. A map is also included to provide an overview of how each proposed magisterial district will physically be divided.

In summary, with the elimination of one district court, more even workload distribution among the three remaining courts will occur. Realignment of the three remaining magisterial districts as proposed will ensure that the workload for all three courts will fall well within fifteen percent (15%) of the judicial district average workload, creating equity among the magisterial district judges of the 18th Judicial District. And, with the elimination of one magisterial district, the average caseload for Clarion County will be more in line with those of similarly situated counties throughout the Commonwealth.

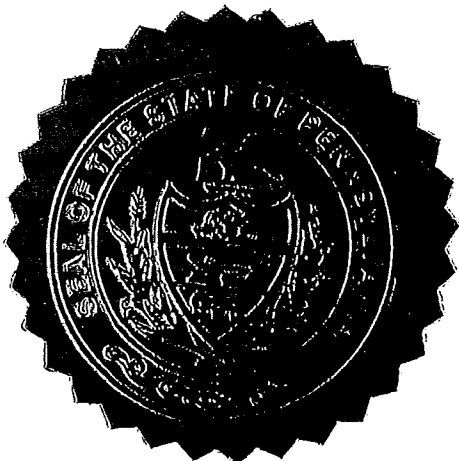

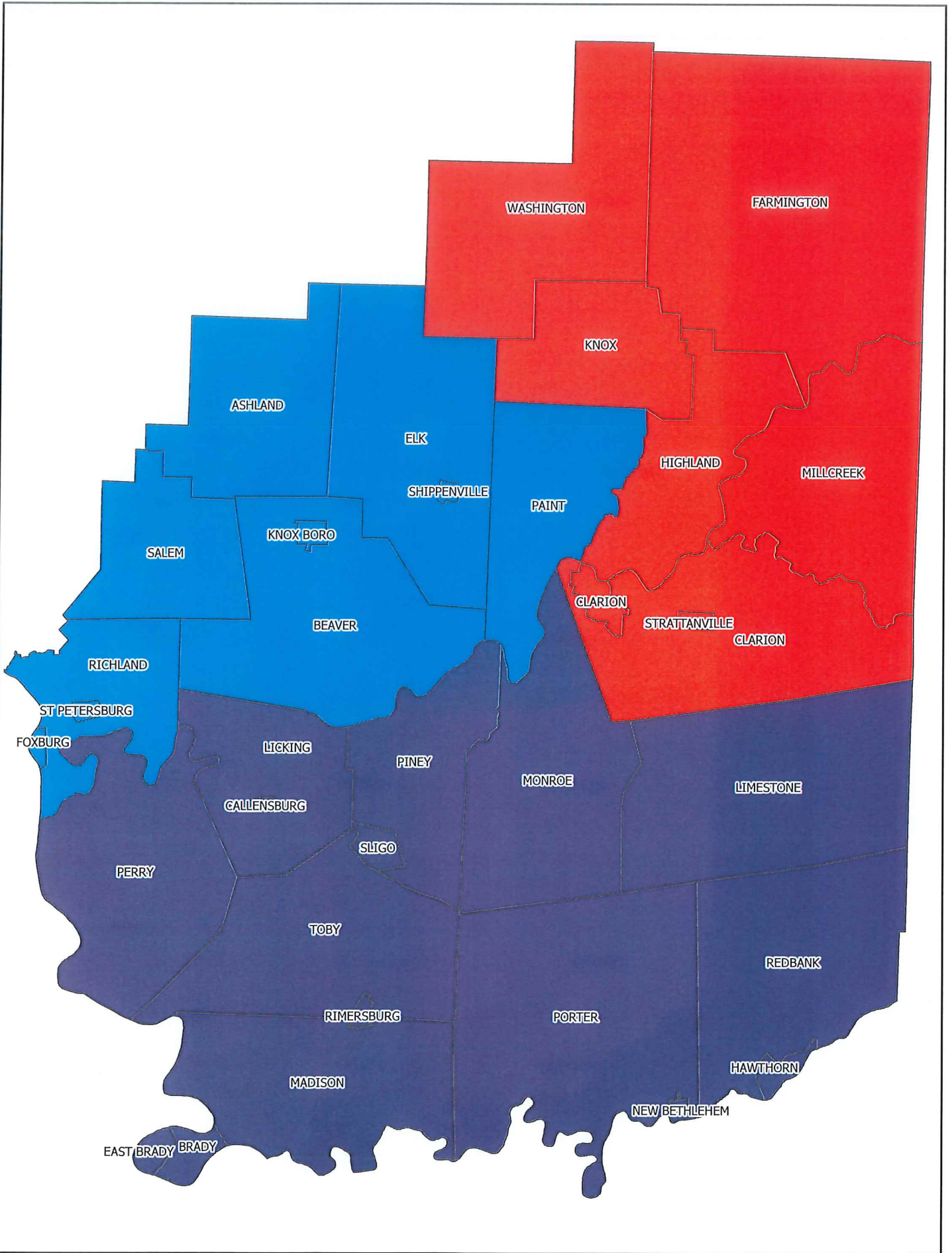
